Zeroing in on the Journey of My Forefathers

Historical and genealogical evidence points to the strong possibility that my male line arrived in Scotland from Flanders around the time of the Norman invasion of England. Over the next hundreds of years various male direct descendants would have chosen from a variety of surnames to fit their professions, family allegiances, home towns, etc., since having a surname became a requirement to assist with tax accountability. The genealogical evidence mentioned above refers to a gedcom submitted by James Ronald Murray, the only of my 37-marker cousins to provide one. When I opened it I discovered that his earliest known ancestor was born in Scotland in the 1600s and died at Baltimore, MD, in the early 1700s. I was quite surprised to have Scotland enter into the Page equation until email-corresponding with a 25-marker cousin Ross Billings. He suggested I do an online search for references to the Flemish in Scotland, which netted the information I've included in this account. As to the "Page" connection, the only ones I've found that were close enough to be counted were all at a genetic distance of 1 at the 12-marker level. Most likely this would have placed our most recent common ancestor near the beginning of our ancestors' adoption of the surname "Page."
