The T. H. Barnes reunion was named in honor of Thomas Hood Barnes. He was a son of David and Mary (Hood) Barnes, and grandson of the Thomas and Sarah (Sittser) Barns, who brought their seven children (eldest to youngest) Melissa, David, Aaron S., Sarah Ellen, Martha Louise, Sophronia Ellen, and Sevira Ellen to Jackson from Seneca Falls, New York, arriving October 24, 1843. T. H. and wife Pearl (Russell), who had no children of their own, restarted in 1924 the lapsed reunion tradition that formerly had been carried on for many years.

The Thomas and Sarah Barns family did not begin spelling their name "Barnes" until after arriving in Michigan. The large, granite marker near which Thomas, Sarah, David, Mary, Arvilla, Aaron S., and other Barneses are buried at Mt. Evergreen Cemetery in Jackson honors this history by carrying the name BARNS. The Barns family remaining behind in Throopsville, Cayuga County, New York changed the spelling to Barnes around the same time (1850s) according to the Storke family genealogy.

Circa 1924

About 80 relatives of the Barnes family held a reunion Sunday at Sharp Park. Members were present from Lansing, Macon, Concord, Hanover, Horton, Rives, Vandercook Lake, Alma, Jerome; Toledo and Elyria, OH. Dinner was served and later in the day, ice cream and cake were also served. William H. Barnes presided at the business meeting. The following officers were elected: President, Lee McGonegal; vice president, Horace Levengood; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Francis [Salsbury]. [The article actually said "Mrs. Frances Barnes," but *Miss* Frances Barnes had already been married to Pearl Salsbury.]

1935

The 11th annual reunion of the Barnes family was held Sunday at Sharp Park with 55 in attendance. Potluck dinner was followed by election of officers. President, Thomas Barnes; vice president, Will Barnes; secretarytreasurer, Mrs. Lyndell McNickle were re-elected.

Reunion minutes mention gasoline rationing as the reason for gathering at Ella Sharp Park during the war years despite other locations being chosen. The home of Charles and Esther Barnes in Rives Junction was to be the 1941 site, Swains Lake near Concord the 1943 site, and the Salsbury farm the 1944 site.

Tom and Hilma Barnes were re-elected as reunion president and vice president at the July 18, 1943, gathering. The next year, July 16, Tom's mother Nellie Barnes was secretary-treasurer *pro tem*, as Tom was in the Army, stationed in Texas, and Hilma was with him.

Per Lyndell's motion at the August 10, 1952 reunion, a record of the year's births, marriages, and deaths was slated to become part of each year's meeting minutes. Helen Leggett, elected secretary-treasurer that year, was the first to do so.

Home of Edith and David "June" Barnes in Horton (now known as the Centennial Farm): 1948 (72), 1951 (52)

Home of Helen and Clyfford Leggett on Baldwin in Horton: 1949 (75)

Bill and Susan Mills, who held the offices for the 1966 reunion, were the first to include an extensive listing of family addresses with reunion minutes. Other such listings occurred in 1972, 1978, 1985, etc.

1975 was the year of the Barnes family photograph by Charles "Allen" Garrett (Bob Garrett, Sr.'s nephew). See page 5 for more information on that gathering, including a complete listing of all who attended that year, their placement in the picture, and who purchased copies of the photograph.

Bob West introduced Ken Smeader, then everyone followed by introducing and telling where we were from, with a pause of cheers while Uncle Clyfford and Aunt Helen stood.

A motion was made by Lois Jackson to elect Robert and Nancy Prus as our 1985 President and Secretary. Motion second by Florence. Accepted. Thanks Bob and Nancy. Bill announced there would be games for the small children and a ball game for all who wish to participate.

Meeting adjourned.

Reunion ended with an afternoon of fun: chatting and a "sing-along" with Bob West at the piano. Great job.

1993 (Barnes family's sesquicentennial in Jackson, Michigan)

A special "media" event happened at the Saturday August 14, 1993, T.H. Barnes reunion. That year, Zandra Denise (Barnes) Kunzelman was reunion president/chairperson. The event was a visit by Linda Tien, Special Writer from the Jackson *Citizen Patriot* newspaper. Linda was there to cover this particular reunion because 1993 was the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary, or sesquicentennial, of the Thomas and Sarah Barnes family arrival in Jackson. The resulting article, including a picture of Jodi VanSumeren creating giant bubbles, and another showing Jennie Paige, Hilma Barnes and Dorothy Davis looking through a family album, appeared in the Monday paper and was titled *150 and going*. Jennie and her sister Helen Leggett were interviewed as "unofficial" family historians, and snippets of family history were shared. (See Page 8 for text of article.)

1995

Reunion officers Zandra Denise Kunzelman and Nancy Jane (Salsbury) Prus began sending reunion notification postcards to a broader range of family, namely younger generation families and singles living away from home. The personalized notifications seem to have been appreciated, as several people came this year who have never come before, or haven't attended in many years.

The only reunion location not accounted for in reunion notes since 1940 was the one held in 1971.

150 and going

Barnes family celebrates longevity with reunion

As about 40 family members laughed and talked over fried chicken and potato salad, a photocopied marriage license displayed on a nearby counter certified the union that brought them all together in the first place.

David Barnes and Mary Hood were married in 1860 and settled in Horton. Many of their descendants still live in Jackson County, and every summer for about the past 70 years, a group of them have gathered for the Barnes family reunion.

"Most of us settled in this area, so it makes it easier to get together for reunions," said Helen Barnes Leggett, 90, of Horton, the granddaughter of David and Mary Barnes.

David Barnes died before Leggett was born, but she does remember her grandmother. Leggett was 12 years old when Mary Barnes died. Also attending the reunion at Tompkins Township Hall was Leggett's sister, Jennie Barnes Paige, 85, of Jackson. As the two oldest family members on hand, the two were the unofficial historians of the day.

"Back in Mary's day, the women had one good black or navy dress," said Paige, "They wore it to funerals and weddings and they were buried in it."

Some of the family's history is retained in the memoirs of Will Barnes, the father of Paige and Leggett. Over the years he kept family stories alive by relating them at family gatherings. His daughters convinced him to write them down before his death in1946.

The history of the Barnes family in Jackson County actually goes back 150 years to Oct. 24, 1843, when Thomas and Sarah Barnes and their seven children came to the area from Seneca Falls, N.Y. One of those children was David Barnes, who was born in 1826.

David Barnes first married a woman named Arvilla, and the couple had a son and a daughter. Later, Arvilla and the boy died during an epidemic. David Barnes then married Mary Hood of Moscow.

During Saturday's reunion, family members browsed through boxes of old photographs, newspaper clippings, postcards and letters relating to the family.

In a genealogy published in 1976 by Jennie Paige's son, Charles W. Paige of Pasadena, Calif., facts about the Barnes family were noted. For example, Mary's twin brothers James Jr. Hood and William Hood both served in the Civil War.

Paige also notes that a few years after his marriage to Mary Hood, David Barnes worked as a keeper at the original State Prison of Southern Michigan and owned one of the houses that once lined the street next to the prison wall between Ganson and North streets.





The Coming to America:

Thomas Barnes, progenitor of our American Barnes family, at age 20 came to America on the Speedwell, sailing from Gravesend, England, Abt May 20, 1656, and landing in Boston, Suffolk Co., MA, on the 27th (what month they arrived is controversial—perhaps as early as June or as late as September), 1656, in company with a group of young men: Shadrack Hopgood age 14, John Fay age 8, Nathaniel Goodinough age 16, and Thomas Goodynough age 20 (spellings are from the ship's register). Below is a transcription of the ship's passenger list, followed by an image of the actual ship's register. All five men would settle in the new town of Marlborough, Middlesex Co., MA

Speedwell Passenger List - names in red are early Marlborough Settlers

This list is annotated by the Searcher's office, Gravesend, England, with the date of "30th May, 1656". However, an additional annotation indicates they "were Landed at Boston in N. E. the 27th of the Moneth, 1656. J. E." The list may have been prepared at departure by the Searcher's office or later by the vessel's master, under a high bond as assurance of the accuracy about those actually making the voyage (such lists were dated at arrival and were endorsed at the Searcher's office on return of the vessel). The source listing, however, shows the "J.E." were not those of the master and the month was not specified. This leaves questions about the month in which the "27th" actually occurred - before, during, or after May. Robert Lock, Master

Gravesend was an important British maritime seat, located in northwest Kent on the south bank of the River Thames opposite *Tilbury in Essex*. The area was also important in some of Charles Dickens' writings. Incidentally, it was at Gravesend that Pocahontas (Native American name Matoaka) died and was buried in March 1617. She, her English husband John Rolfe, and their two-year-old son Thomas, had just set sail from London on their way to the American colony of Virginia, when Pocahontas suddenly fell ill. She died shortly after they took her ashore at Gravesend.

The Speedwell, originally commissioned in 1577 as the Swiftsure, was nearly as important in American history as the Mayflower. After the Speedwell brought a group of religious dissenters from Leiden, Holland, to England, she and the Mayflower set sail for America in 1620 with their cargos of Puritan passengers. However, the Speedwell soon proved to be unseaworthy and had to turn back, forcing the Mayflower to finish the voyage on her own. The voyage that brought our Thomas Barnes to America also brought an early group of Quakers. Unfortunately, the governor of Massachusetts was persecuting Quakers at that time, and some of them got deported back to England.
